#### Kevin Perry: Every Little Drop of Rain

Kevin Perry, owner of <u>Urban Rain Design</u> and a lecturer in the LA+ED program, also leads the student club, <u>Student Leadership in Green</u> <u>Infrastructure (SLGI)</u>, where students from any major come together to design and build green infrastructure projects that are simple and cost-effective.

Most recently, Perry and SLGI completed a rain garden outside of Young Hall on the UC Davis campus that was featured in the <u>Davis</u> <u>Enterprise</u>. Journalist Tanya Perez writes, "[...] the rain garden has a storm water runnel - a narrow channel down the center that water flows through from the downspout - with triangular sections of droughttolerant plants. [...] as soon as [the water] hits the soil [...] the water is meant to spread out. 'Depending on how much rainfall, it may 'pond up' then soak into the ground,' [Perry] said. 'We're trying to replicate what happens in nature,' adding, 'Ultimately, that water will help replenish the aquifer,' which he said is a main goal of an urban rain garden."
