HDE 110V: Families in Communities Summer Session II 2023: MTW: 2:10-4:25 PM via ZOOM

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Course Description

This course focuses on family members' roles, interactions, and development, and how families are impacted by the larger community and society in which they live. Examples of relevant topics/issues include: family roles, gender, divorce, acculturation, employment, housing, schools, migration, and policies relevant to family well-being. Basic components of the research process will be introduced. This course provides a research-oriented overview of the theoretical perspectives of interpersonal relationships that exist within diverse family contexts. The focus is on relationship dynamics, such as marital relationships, parent-child relationships, and sibling relationships. Also considered are linkages between family processes and larger social ecologies and structures.

Learning Goals

- 1. Apply family theories and methods to the unique interactions and dynamics that occur within a family
- 2. Analyze the developmental pathways of family construction and critical life transitions (e.g., dating, marriage, divorce, parenthood)
- 3. Identify and critique within family interaction patterns, and compare differences and similarities across families from different ethnicities, religions, races, economic background, sexual orientation, etc.
- 4. Interpret family research, and apply this research to policies, laws, and regulations surrounding the economy, work/family conflict, child care etc.

Course Materials:

Required text: Cohen, Philip, N. (2020). *The Family: Diversity, Inequality, and Social Change* (3rd ed.). Textbook can be accessed in Canvas Bookshelf. Other readings, podcasts, or videos will be posted on Canvas.

Course Format

Class is held on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays from 2:10-4:25pm. This class is a synchronous course experience. You are expected to attend each class. Synchronous lectures will be held via Zoom; all other course content and materials can be found on the class Canvas page.

Working Syllabus: The instructor reserves the right to change the syllabus, along with readings, assignments, and due dates. Updated 8.3.2023.

There will be readings and assignments to complete outside scheduled lecture hours. Prior to each class meeting, you will be expected to review content on the corresponding Canvas Module Page, including the supplementary videos. These videos should be viewed **prior** to lecture. Each class meeting will also have a **groupwork** activity to support your learning and application of course content. In addition to these graded in-class activities, there will be regular reading quizzes on textbook chapters and two formal exams (see **Course Evaluation & Assignments** below).

Groupwork

Groupwork can help students develop a host of skills that are not only beneficial to their learning and success in the course, but that are increasingly important in the professional world (see additional benefits <u>here</u>) This course mixes direct instruction, individual exploration, and collaborative groupwork. It is **not** a passive class experience. Students will be expected to engage in whole-class discussion and small group work with your peers. Use this course as an opportunity to grow in both your oral and written communication skills.

Reading Quizzes (30%)

There will be a reading quiz for each assigned chapter from the text. These quizzes test knowledge learned from the required textbook. All quizzes will be on Canvas. While quizzes are all open note/open book, you must work independently. Quizzes are timed and must be taken in one sitting – you will have 30 minutes to complete each quiz. There will be no re-dos, but your lowest quiz score will be dropped.

Group Participation (40%)

To ensure student's attendance and active engagement with course content, there will be an in-class activity during each synchronous class meeting. Activities will often be completed in groups and will take a variety of forms including quizzes, writing assignments, research, and homework. In-Class Assignments will be due the same day they were assigned. There will be built-in time in class to work on them; they will be due by 11:59PM that evening.

These assignments are designed to have you more critically engage with lecture content and course materials. Engaging in all the assigned learning activities will help in your learning and improve your grade through better test, quiz, and paper grades. If you complete all in-class assignments, your lowest 3 scores will be dropped. If you are **not** present for class, you **cannot** receive credit for that in-class activity. However, each student will be allowed 3 "freebies" (i.e., you can miss 3 in-class assignments without being penalized.

Exams (30%)

There will be two exams throughout the course. Exam 1 will cover content from weeks 1-3; Exam 2 will cover content from weeks 4-6. Each exam contains two portions (multiple choice AND short answer) and will cover materials presented in the synchronous lecture, in-class activities/discussion, and posted content from Canvas (**not** material specific to the textbook). Exams will be available during the assigned class meeting time. You will not be able to take an exam before the assigned date. Make-up exams will only be given in extreme cases, pending Instructor approval. In order to be eligible for a make-up exam, you will need to: 1. Email your instructor at least **two hours prior** to the start of the scheduled exam; 2. Provide written documentation of your excuse. If you follow these guidelines **and** your instructor determines that your situation meets the necessary criteria, you will be able to take a make-up exam that is different from the original exam, both in content and format. Otherwise, you will receive a zero for the exam.
