This course is designed to introduce undergraduates to methodological issues in the scientific study of human development.

Specifically, students will:

- Think critically about research designs, findings, and conclusions; and be able to design a reasonable study to test scientific hypotheses.
- Communicate hypotheses, research designs, and findings clearly and concisely and in a manner consistent

with APA style.

 Actively design and conduct scientific research. To facilitate this, the class emphasizes laboratory participation and written assignments.

Keys to Success

Please contribute to a respectful, safe, and supportive class environment. Please choose not to talk with classmates during lecture or use electronic devices for purposes other than class participation and taking notes.
